OUR IMPACT AREAS

Areas of Intervention

Access to Health

Good health and well-being are the foundation upon which all communities are built. Unfortunately, many communities still lack access to clean water, sanitation and hygiene facilities, and nutritious food, making them highly vulnerable to recurring health issues. Our programs promote good health and precautionary practices including awareness through volunteering, subsidizing cancer treatment for children, and facilitating free medical counseling for families.

Early Childhood

Early childhood is an extremely vulnerable period for children in economically and developmentally challenged communities. To address these issues effectively, we ensure a holistic approach. The families of the children, especially the mothers, go through a lot of hardship to raise their infants.

Our social intervention in early childhood development looks beyond the provision of basic medical care and education, it addresses major challenges faced by different communities. Our education and health programs are designed to be dependent on stakeholder participation.

Youth Success

We believe that youth success can be a catalyst for societal reform. United Way India provides a foundation for the youth from underprivileged communities to obtain practical training, enabling them to make the most of employment opportunities in the organized sector.

We also administer educational programs, with focus on STEM subjects, for children between the age group of 5 and 15 years. These efforts involve the distribution of educational kits, implementation of educational sponsorship programs, and equipping schools with infrastructural aid and learning materials.



Areas of Intervention



Income Mobility

With every step we take and every choice we make, we aim to empower individuals. We make skilling and training accessible to the members of underprivileged communities, which helps them overcome financial obstacles and improve their quality of life. Our scope of work also includes sustainable employment generation – both economically and environmentally.

Our initiatives go beyond practical groundwork to advocacy of policy making that addresses the same.

Environment Sustainability

No community can thrive while the environment around is in a state of deterioration. Our programs for community welfare go hand-in-hand with environmental protection and reclamation. For instance, the rejuvenation of water bodies provides a viable water source for local communities and improves ground-water levels. Promoting green-schools, protecting vulnerable ecosystems, and implementing tree-plantation drives are all part of our environmental intervention towards a sustainable future.

Gender, Equity, Diversity and Inclusion

United Way India undertakes a variety of programmes to promote gender equality, diversity and inclusion. In the exercise of creating equal opportunities for all, our programs have massively helped to skill members of various communities and encouraged them to start their journey of economic independence. Our projects have successfully provided vocational scholarships to diverse groups of people. The process initiated with understanding their interests & aptitudes, linking them to appropriate courses, ensuring they received assistance for vocational training, providing them hand holding post-training, grooming, and providing personality development skills.

Areas of Intervention

United Way India has empowered the transgender community with alternate livelihood skills that helped them lead a dignified and respectable life. Our awareness sessions have been helpful for the transgender community, as it has helped in building their knowledge on health and applicable government schemes.

All the programmes under gender equality, diversity and inclusion aim to sensitize communities and make them aware of their rights and abilities through capacity building support.

Disaster relief

United Way India actively undertakes disaster relief and rehabilitation work during natural calamities like floods, earth quakes, cyclones etc. The implementation is done through urgent relief, need assessment, rehabilitation and facilitating basic necessities like medical supply, food and water security in affected areas.

COVID-19 Response and Rehabilitation

Vulnerable communities were primarily impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. United Way India showed its grit and resilience by supporting people in need till the last mile. The efforts directly focused on improving the state of distressed communities by providing dry ration, sanitation kits, relief material, healthcare access, and awareness and sensitization about the pandemic.

United Way India showed its preparedness for such challenges and is rebuilding communities where everyone has access to quality life and can thrive.

COVID-19 Relief and Response



COVID-19 pandemic unleashed social and health crisis worldwide. India also faced massive impact, increasing the already existing social divide. The urban and rural areas faced set back for daily necessities like food, water, medical supplies, etc. Migrant population was left helpless, medical infrastructures failed at upholding the vast number of patients, leading to deaths and displacements. Large scale spread of COVID-19 majorly occurred in the communities with lack of advance medical facilities, knowledge of the virus, misinformation around the virus which led to multiple challenges.

United Way India took the responsibility to dispel these baseless myths and spread awareness regarding COVID-19 as well as the upcoming vaccines which will easily prevent the spread of the deadly virus. United Way India undertook measures to spread awareness about the pandemic and adherence to appropriate prevention behavior. All the interventions were implemented considering the need of the hour and its relevance to the communities.

Hospitals and medical institutions across the nation faced severe challenges; acute shortage of equipment, machinery, medical infrastructure along with the overburdened medical staff.

United Way India relentlessly worked to provide adequate support to the hospitals during the pandemic. The network geared up to combat COVID-19 and supported several hospitals across the country.

Hungry No More



To combat hunger and to maintain food security for people living in crisis, United Way India started the 'Hungry No More' campaign to support people with two meals a day.

By adhering to all safety and hygiene measures during the COVID-19 pandemic, United Way India network began its relief service by providing food kits to the marginalized and low-income segment of the society. It majorly comprised daily wage workers, migrant laborers, construction workers, site workers, and other needy people. With the help of local communities across the country, United Way India has distributed thousands of food kits. The 'Hungry No More' program catered to millions of people with food that eventually helped them regain their strength and fight starvation.

MISSION WO-MAN-GROVES: Mangrove plantation by women in Sunderbans

13 CLIMATE ACTION



United Way India in collaboration with our on ground implementation partner MUKTI planted 31,500+ mangrove saplings with the help of 26 women in Raidighi, a cyclone prone region in Sundarbans, West Bengal. These women were responsible for collecting seeds, planting and maintaining mangroves for a period of one year and forward. To acknowledge their support, they were provided with monthly family ration support. The women engaged in the programme attended seminars conducted by experts on importance of mangroves, with an emphasis on ecosystem linkages so that they can also contribute towards sustainability in their community.

Community Involvement: Approx. 500 families benefitted from the plantation. 20-25% of the community is directly involved in this project through different activities like plantation, awareness programmes etc.

Engagement with local government stakeholders: Interaction and motivation of local PRI's members to plant more mangroves helped us at the time of the Yaas cyclone.

Education support program



Nationwide COVID-19 induced lockdown, devastating burnt of AMPHAN cyclone and other strong cyclonic storms in the state of West Bengal, necessitated urgent support for the educational institutions. There was a need to look into the requirements of students and schools as the state was heading towards reopening of the educational institutions, following the necessary mandates of safety. United Way India's four interventions addressed the vertical of education by targeting 'SDG 4: Education for all

Katalyst program of Human Capital for Third Sector was supported by United Way India through Kennametal India Ltd, with the intent of liberating women from low income communities, through the pursuit of professional education. The initiative prepared young women for leadership roles, thereby bridging the gender gap in corporate India. Katalyst achieved this objective through a blend of unique development interventions, including proprietary and scientifically researched curriculum, and personalised mentoring.

UNITED WAY OF BARODA

United Fusion Study Project

49% Indian Parents work extra hours for their children's education.

84% Indian parents rely on their income to meet up their children fees' cost.

As a flagship project launched in the year 2005, United Fusion Study Foundation Project has been serving the impoverished students by providing them interest free loans. This project furnishes opportunities to the students who are willing to pursue their graduation or post-graduation studies in fields such as Engineering, Medical, Chartered Account, Business Management and pure streams and professional courses through direct financial aid for education, lodging and boarding expenses. Success stories we receive have conveyed the result of our efforts made and serve as benchmark for us to unite and create lasting impact on the communities we serve. Presently, the project supports:



343 students are employed in multinational companies like Infosys, ONGC, Indian Oil Corporation, Torrent Power, National Thermal Power Corporation Ltd, Reliance Industries Ltd, Larsen & Toubro Limited, Axis Bank and medical students have established their own specialist clinics. The project is majorly supported by two organisations: Stichting Fusion Study Foundation, Netherlands and United Way of Baroda. At times, many philanthropies, Board members, Dr. A.C Shah Trust and Corporate partners Reinhardt Roto Machines, Koch Chemical Technology Group India Pvt Ltd., INOX Air Products Pvt Ltd., have also joined hands with us to support this project.

Highlights of the year:

Total 338 applications received through offline and online mode out of which 170 students were selected from all over Gujarat.

170 students were interviewed for higher education program for the year 2020-21.

152 Laptops have been distributed to underprivileged college students. Students have shared their failure and success stories through platform provided by UWB.

148 new students and 114 old students have been supported financially this year.

Gold card scheme

Betty Friedan said, "Ageing is not lost youth but a new stage of opportunity and strength." Being the first project launched for the senior citizens in the year 1998, the project has successfully completed 22 years. Gold card project aims to serve the senior citizens by supporting them with their daily tasks, various repairing solutions for plumbing and electronic appliances, routine health check-ups on regular basis, full body check-ups from renowned hospitals and recreational activities organised to make their life cheerful and happy.



Harishchandra and Sudhaben Harshe are the couple Gold Card Members at United Way of Baroda since the last 15 years and are above the age of 85. They were quoting the words of gratitude towards United Way of Baroda saying, "We are proud being the oldest Gold Card members who are receiving multiple services for our convenience. This makes it easy for us to complete our routine tasks. We have been referring our other friends to get registered as Gold Card members to avail such benefits."

Shishu kit project: Swastha shishu ek pahel

The National Population Policy 2000 recommended a holistic strategy for bringing about inter-sectoral co-ordination at the grass - root level by involving NGOs, Civil Society, Panchayat Raj Institutions and Women self-help groups in reducing maternal mortality. Maternal mortality ratio of India for the period 2016-18 as per the latest report of the National Sample Registration system is 113 per 100,000 live births while talking about Gujarat, the maternal mortality ratio sums up to 87 per 100,000 live births. The decline in the ratio in terms of nation and state has not been majorly affected.



United Way of Baroda in support with Lalitbhai Patel Foundation has been running Shishu Kit Project since 2018 to safeguard the motherhood and child health. This project aims to sensitize women on motherhood and childcare related issues and address their needs. This project offers medical equipment for the neonates to government hospitals and also aid to the women by providing comprehensive kits including pack of sanitary napkins, baby clothes, baby wrap towel, plastic mattress, iron and calcium tablets, mothers gown, health awareness leaflets and much more. United Way of Baroda has reached out and catered to 16,900+ women and their infants who went for institutional delivery at government hospitals. This project is being executed in two districts: Vadodara and Anand covering 5 Hospitals. Through 15 sessions conducted on behavioral change, communication on the topics of breastfeeding practices, importance of immunization and schedule, sanitization & hygiene practices for infants and mothers, postpartum care of mothers from nutrition perspective; it was observed that mothers do not have proper knowledge about the vaccination schedule and intake to fight diseases. Implementation of this project shows that mothers have enough knowledge about breastfeeding practices and newborn care. Mothers who went through normal delivery, breastfeeding practices used to get 1-2 hours of birth along with colostrum and none of the children were fed with pre-lacteals.

Social Inclusivity

Bringing people closer together by eliminating the distances created by social and economic conditions becomes fundamental to the progress of the society.

World Disability Day Celebration

On World Day of Disability, United Way of Baroda distributed clothes and ration kits to various NGO partners working on disabled individuals. NGO partners like Sai Residency, Disha Charitable Trust and Arpan Charitable Trust were provided with ration kits. Clothes were donated to beneficiaries of Mahavir Foundation and Kalarav Special School.

Tricycle Distribution Event

United Way of Baroda with the support of NGO partner V-one Society, recognised the situation of differently abled individuals and thereby organised an event to distribute tricycles in order to mobilise them from one place to another and provide support for livelihood.

The state of happiness was seen on the face of all the beneficiaries when they received tricycles. They were also served with delicious food and juice and their hygiene was completely taken care of.

Support Roadside Library

Lockdown has had more financial effect on the people belonging to lower sector of the society. Humble hearted individual, named Pradeep was facing financial crisis. He has been running roadside library since last 20 years to create a sense of reading among the citizens of Vadodara. He had a wish to set up his library again and thus United Way of Baroda provided him 110 new books and LED light to light up his library along with necessary equipment. He was also provided with family essentials which has helped him to reduce his family expenses.



Rural Development Programme

United Way of Baroda has been working to improve the quality of life of the underprivileged communities of Vadodara and its rural areas since the last three decades. More than 1800 rural students have been supported for education for 8 years. In addition, since 2013, United Way of Baroda has braced up its support and has created access to safe drinking water by installation of RO Water Cooler System in 70+ rural schools benefitting 50,000+ rural students of neighbouring rural areas of Vadodara. Also, for working to maintain a sustainable environment along with aligning with the scheme launched by Gujarat Government, United Way of Baroda rejuvenated lakes in 12 villages of Halol Block, Panchmahal to combat the water crisis situation through water conservation practices. 10 schools in the rural area of Vadodara were converted into Green Schools by installing Solar Panels, RainWater Harvesting Systems, and plantation activities conducted throughout the year.



Integrated Rural Development Program was launched in the year 2018 to have complete focus on overall development of the villages. In this context, 10 villages of Panchmahal District were identified. This program works with a motive to have an amalgamating focus on various aspects in the area of Education, STEM Enhancement, Health, Infrastructure Provision, Empowerment and Livelihood, Solid Waste Management and Employee Volunteering.

Under focused Quality Education for 3 years, the targeted schools saw 93% school result in 12th Board Exams, which is the first highest result in the school history. Till date, 258+ students have been provided with quality education.

Under infrastructural enhancement for quality education for the rural students, 1 Mini Science Laboratory with 109 hands on Models and 1 Smart Classroom and 2 Computer Laboratories with needed peripherals were established in the rural schools of Halol. Rural schools were provided with sport items to enhance extracurricular activities.

For better Healthcare, 2 Community Water ATMs along with provision of PET Jars of 20 Litres were established for rural communities. It has become self-reliant and charges a small token for access to safe drinking water for rural communities. The excess amount of token earned through water ATM will be used to enhance the livelihood of local workers who can work under Solid Waste Management Project.

During COVID-19 pandemic, 108 villages of Halol Block, Panchmahal were fumigated for safeguarding the rural communities. Also, more than 1250 individuals were provided with family essentials. Support was extended towards Local rural healthcare Centres with 80 Oxygen Flowmeter and 6 Handholds Plus Oximeter.

Women Empowerment led to skill enhancement of rural women of Halol Block, Panchmahal district in the areas of Sewing/Embroidery/Computer course. Several women initiated work from home model. Additionally, women enrolled in computer courses have got placed in well-known companies.

Solid Waste Management project resulted in collection of more than 2300+ dry waste out of which 13 benches were made for community usage. Out of the wet waste collected till date, 750+ Litre Liquid fertilizer and 240+ Kg of fertilizer powder (organic) has been generated.

Born Learning Campaign



Born Learning Campaign (BLC) - A national-level flagship program is being implemented since 2017. The campaign has been conceptualized and designed to provide an optimal learning environment to children below six years at the Anganwadi Centres (AWCs) and equip them with school readiness. Despite the pandemic and temporary closure of Anganwadi Centres, the BLC program ensured children continued learning. Learning materials were developed and shared virtually. Anganwadi workers and parents were trained virtually to ensure smooth delivery of learning tools and progress of children.



Rural Rising

A sustainable standard of living of rural communities can be ensured by empowering local people and enabling them to explore opportunities through varied interventions which are based on four pillars of the program.



Livelihood Support

We supported rural communities especially women, and persons with disabilities (PwDs) to increase their incomes through training on a range of skills, livestock distribution, formation of cooperative models and entrepreneurship programs for women, youth and PwDs.

Education Support

Infrastructure support to schools and Anganwadi centres, helping students from economically weaker sections pursue education through scholarship and mentorship were key initiatives undertaken this year.

Health Interventions

Constant support to Primary Health Centres through refurbishment and resource support, provision of water purifiers to schools and communities, health care services to remote villages through our Mobile Clinic with experienced health professionals were some of the major work done this year.

Environment Interventions

Our efforts towards the sustenance of natural resources through soil and water conservation initiatives, the introduction of environment appropriate and sustainable livelihood promotions and sanitation intervention have helped local communities address issues like scarcity of water and electricity, management of solid wastes etc.

Health & Disaster risk reduction

The interventions around health and disaster risk reduction had been encompassed under education and livelihood projects as well as integrated rural development projects. But gradually it was realized the urgency to scale up our efforts amidst the pandemic and other natural disasters. Some of our interventions are listed down

The Mobile Health Clinic

The Mobile Health Clinic that operates in Doddaballapur has served as a mini hospital equipped with oxygen cylinders, lifelines, stretchers and emergency equipment, drugs cabinet etc. during the pandemic. The clinic is equipped with health professionals like a doctor, a nurse and volunteers and reaches out to 30 villages treating about patients per month on average. The Mobile Health Clinic was a saviour during the lockdown and continuously catered to the villagers who could not visit their Primary Health Clinics which are situated about 8 to 10 km away.

Health Camps

To ensure the well-being and good health of the communities we work with, health camps were organised for marginalised communities. General body checkups, awareness on health and hygiene, gynecology related treatment for adolescent girls and pregnant women were organised.

Strengthening Primary Health Centres (PHCs) and empowering frontline health workers

India's healthcare system faced sudden challenges during the pandemic with the increasing number of COVID-19 cases and not matching infrastructure and equipment to support the demand. Hence giving attention to PHCs and preparing them for any future health crises seemed important than ever before. With the help of corporate support, PHCs were strengthened with equipment and consumables, infrastructure support and capacity building training to empower several front line health workers.

Support to communities during Cyclone Fani and Cyclone Amphan

Cyclone Fani and Cyclone Amphan caused widespread damage in Eastern India, specifically in West Bengal and Odisha. People lost their lives and livelihoods, shelters and crops. In collaboration with our CSR partners, affected communities were supported with ration and hygiene kits, shelter construction and refurbishment and livelihoods (repairing boats and fishing nets and providing seed grants to SHGs).



Financial aid for street vendors

Since the beginning of Covid- 19, UWC has identified and supported over 800 street vendors until March 2021, whose livelihoods have been affected by the pandemic. Beneficiaries of this program include communities such as transgenders, differently-abled, women & marginalised street vendors.

Rapid urbanization has greatly reduced the availability of green spaces, leading to ecological degradation, reduced air quality, reduced ground water etc. Keeping this in consideration, it has become pertinent that available land be re-green. It is with this intention that United Way of Chennai in partnership with Greater Chennai Corporation, supported by AGS Health has set out to create a mini forest using the aforementioned Miyawaki method at the OSR land (TVH avenue, Shozhinganallur). This land measures 395.43 sq m (Division number 197, Zone 15) and was devoid of any vegetation at the time of taking on the project.

Micro-entrepreneurship through bunk shops

The focus point of this project lay in empowering differently-abled people financially, by commissioning bunk shops. Lack of employment opportunities leave people in the differently-abled community as an economic burden to their family members. Keeping this in mind, Aspire System and United Way Chennai collaborated to implement a pre-fabricated petty shop structure that can be easily installed.



Making schools accessible and inclusive

United Way Chennai has been working towards holistic development of Schools which are in dire need of interventions. To make these interventions more focused and impactful, UWC works along with the SSA (Samagra Siksha Abhiyan) and other government bodies overseeing education related programmes. Based on the information provided by SSA, an initial assessment of a few schools were made in Thiruvallur district, out of which 6 schools were found to have inadequate accessible facilities and were hence chosen for this project. These Panchayat Union Primary Schools are located in Thiruvallur District, a rapidly growing suburb. Currently there are 535 (including 16 differently abled) children studying at the 6 schools. There are 31 full time teachers in these schools (including HM) and a helper.

Through the support of HT Parekh Foundation, these schools are being made accessible, their infrastructure being improved, the students, teachers and community members are being sensitized on the needs of the differently abled and a local support staff is being provided to conduct community awareness programs to encourage parents with differently abled children to enroll their children in schools. This program commenced in September 2020.



Anganwadi Development

Anganwadis set the foundation for future learning for children from low-income communities. Unfortunately, many of them have fallen into a state of utter disrepair across the state. Through our Anganwadi Development Programme, we have established a safe and conducive learning environment in 9 Anganwadis across the state.

This includes:

- Refurbishing and renovating the physical infrastructure
- Training facilitators to improve learning outcomes
- Engaging community members through monthly committee meetings
- Mobilizing screening camps for early identification of disabilities.



Water Bodies Rejuvenation



Tamil Nadu and its capital city, Chennai, have been struggling with acute water shortage for years. Last year, Chennai witnessed a historic drought, the worst in 70 years. This is because we depend on annual monsoons for water, and one bad year has drastic consequences. Moreover, existing water bodies have disappeared or become polluted due to rapid urbanization and neglect. Indiscriminate usage and lack of conservation practices has further exacerbated groundwater depletion.

The only viable long term solution is to improve groundwater recharge. Thus, we invested our time & resources in rejuvenating water bodies across the city. Through this initiative, we restore traditional lakes/ponds from their current state of neglect by:

- De-silting and removing harmful vegetation
- Cleaning water inlets & outlets
- Strengthening embankments

We also beautify the lake by building walkways and installing solar lights. We ensure sustained maintenance of the lake by educating the community and encouraging them to take ownership of the lake. Last year, we worked exclusively with Caterpillar to rejuvenate 3 lakes in Tamil Nadu.



UNITED WAY OF DELHI

Youth Success

United Way Delhi, through its programs, works towards enabling the youth to achieve their full potential through the means of contextual interventions in the fields of education, health, skill building, life skills, sanitation & hygiene, and more. Aligned to the New Education Policy, United Way Delhi's School Centered Community Development Program has envisaged ensuring the holistic transformation of the children and youth from the marginalized communities. The SCCD program seeks to keep schools at the center and reach out to the children, youth and community members through holistic transformation. The three major components of SCCD includes; NEEV, School Support Program (SSP), and Karvaan- Youth Resource Centre. Other key focus areas under this domain include promoting scientific temperament through the promotion of STEM Learning.

To strengthen our healthcare system. Our intervention included facilitation of essential equipment, high-end medical machinery, RT-PCR testing infrastructure, etc in 15+ hospitals in Delhi, U.P, Haryana, Punjab, Tamil Nadu, Maharashtra, Gujarat.


Frontliners Support Package To facilitate necessary protective gear for frontliners including Police Personnel, Sanitation Workers, Health Workers etc.

Family Support Package

Due to the ongoing pandemic and lockdown, economic activity other than essential services has come to a halt, affecting the livelihoods of thousands of migrant laborers. Under our campaign, we supported migrant laborers with a family essentials kit (dry ration and hygiene supplies) for a period of 60 days.

Digital Education Support Program

Due to the ongoing pandemic, and schools going virtual, a fair section of the government-school/NGO-schools going children faced difficulties in continuing their education due to lack of access to digital devices, internet connection. United Way Delhi in partnership with NGOs worked towards bridging this gap and ensuring holistic and quality education for all, with an evolved and digital approach amidst pandemic.



Environment

United Way Delhi works to combat the issue of environment degradation and promote environment sustainability with the conscious efforts of people. Through our various initiatives, we help provide communities with a greener, safer, and healthier environment across India. We integrate the components of environment in our projects as well as volunteering initiatives to contribute to the Sustainable Development Goals and raise awareness about the cause. United Way Delhi strives to sensitize human beings mostly in the densely populated urban regions of India through campaigns and programs like United for Air, Green Your Space, Green Your School & Why Waste under an initiative of NIRA - Nature is Requesting Action. The primary motive of NIRA and the programs under it is to bring behavioral changes in society involving adults and youth to acknowledge, monitor and take suitable actions to save and revive the environment through sustainable approaches. Instilling the idea of protecting the environment in schools and communities churns the process of greener and better place to live in.



UNITED WAY OF HYDERABAD

COVID-19 Relief

Covid-19 was not just a life-threatening bio-medical pandemic, but a pandemic of extreme poverty, unemployment, food scarcity and healthcare challenges. Under the Covid relief program from 2020 to 2021, United Way of Hyderabad supported Covid affected families, individuals & groups with grocery kits or livelihood support, and government medical institutions & hospitals with medical equipment in Telangana State.

IT4TS Campaign

The IT4TS campaign was part of an initiative to support the Government in its acquisition of protective gear and machinery. Along with a cohort of industry bodies, corporate, and non profits, UW Hyderabad contributed 48 COVID -19 diagnosis equipment to Government hospitals in Telangana. We further supplied masks, sanitizer, and PPE Kits to Gandhi Hospital, the primary covid treatment centre in the state, to the Cyberabad & Rachakonda Police Commissionerate, and to GHMC workers.



Grocery & Hygiene Kits

Thanks to our network of NGO partners and Government connections, UW Hyderabad was able to identify the needs of the city's

most vulnerable: daily wage workers and other individuals who had lost their livelihoods due to the pandemic and were looking for support. With an online campaign as well as support from corporate donors, we put together dry ration and essential hygiene material support for the daily wage earners, laborers, migrant workers, and families

Health and Well being

United Way of Hyderabad started several interventions to strengthen Public Healthcare Centres and support the nutritional well being of pregnant and lactating mothers. UW Hyderabad also supports healthcare needs of orphan babies, and the welfare of HIV+ individuals, vulnerable children, and elders in homes through partner NGOs.

Reducing Maternal and Infant Mortality

Globally, Child and Maternal mortality are key indicators of development. They are indicators of societies priority towards building a healthy future; UW Hyderabad's work under our health vertical is aligned to this. With the onset of the pandemic and the absence of children from the anganwadis, we found it an opportune time to work with pregnant and lactating mothers who are part of the anganwadi system.

We observed that there was a deficit of knowledge in regard to health and hygiene. With the help of a consultant from the National Institute of Nutrition, we planned a robust curriculum of 8 topics related to pregnancy and nutrition. A group of 50 pregnant/lactating mothers were identified and a knowledge assessment was conducted at the start of the program. After training we found that their awareness levels on nutrition and well being towards a safe and happy baby had increased from 4.72% to an astounding 60%

Maria a high risk pregnant mother from Bapunagar Anganwadi, Golconda had multiple health issues and was extremely underweight. Even in her 7th month she weighed only 38 kgs which was a matter of concern to the health of the baby. She started attending the nutrition sessions held at the Anganwadi, and the Field Officer made daily calls to monitor her dietary intake. A 4-5 meal a day diet plan was given to her to follow and she was monitored closely. At the end of her 9th month, she had gained a good six kg and the baby was born a healthy baby weight of 3 kg. Like Maria, all the high risk and underweight mothers were monitored closely every day to ensure that mothers didn't lose their lives during child birth and babies were born healthy.*

Strengthening Health Systems

2020 to 2021 saw a ramp up of healthcare activities, specifically in upgrading Primary and community-based health care centres. The selected PHCs were based primarily around Hyderabad with a high number of dependents; particularly towards maternity & infant care support. They also handled primary emergency response like snake bites. Simple intervention like providing refrigerators to store emergency medicines and injections were found beneficial. The impact seen post our interventions included a reduction in referrals to larger district hospitals and an increase in the number of institutional deliveries



Decent work and economic growth

Project Hunar

Project Hunar is United Way of Hyderabad's keystone livelihood project that helps enable youth to achieve dignified, productive employment. It provides avenues for youth to identify their aptitudes and reconnect them to the workforce. When the Hunar Skilling Centre first started in 2019, it took time to bring about the attitudinal change of the community needed for the program to flourish. However, over the past year, the graph of enrolment of youth from the local community to the physical centre has increased tremendously despite the pandemic. The students Girls and Boys from community - are trained on computer skills and English communication skills for three month at the Centre. Computer training includes MS Office, Google Suite and awareness of social media, while English communication includes grammar, interview skills and job readiness activities. Not only does the program inculcate skills that are highly relevant to today's job market, after three a month of the course, a Job Drive is conducted at the Hunar Centre to place the students

Asad Khan* is 19 years old, from Falakhnuma, Hyderabad. He lives with his family – of 2 parents and 6 siblings. Only two other members of his family work. Asad left school at 16 to help contribute to his family's finances. He found out about the Hunar center in 2020 and joined the Medical General Duty Assistant training program. He excelled, learning how to use the computer, care for patients, and manage emergencies. He now has a job at a hospital that he loves. Although Asad's family was reluctant to let him work at a hospital during the pandemic, Asad understood the importance of his job and convinced his family to let him continue. He wants to continue to advance his career in the medical field to keep his family happy and well.



Reducing Inequality

The 2020 Hyderabad floods had caused extensive damage leading to disruption of normal life. Several colonies were inundated with rainwater, making people's lives miserable. Localities such as the Al Jubail colony continued to be under several feet of water even after the rains stopped. When the waters receded from areas, they left behind huge mounds of trash and mangled vehicles, and houses covered in mud. Necessities such as clothes, groceries, utensils, and even vehicles and other necessities had also been washed away in the floodwaters. In October 2020, the United Way of Hyderabad started the Flood Relief Project to support the Flood affected families and Government schools in Hyderabad city. The program aimed to renovate the Flood ravaged homes and schools and revitalise families and livelihoods



Fight against COVID-19

India has been one of the most affected countries during the pandemic, facing an unprecedented challenge to public health, food systems, livelihood and life in general. Admittedly with inadequate public health infrastructure, high density of population, low socio-economic conditions containing the spread of the disease in our country was bound to be a difficult task. Over the last year, much of our work was aimed at fighting against COVID-19. UWM commenced its COVID-19 response interventions in March with the aim of fighting the spread of the virus, keeping health workers safe and supporting community resilience. This would not have been possible without the immense support of our donors. This included 95+ corporates, 9 individual fundraisers and 13000+ donors who contributed through more than 20 fundraising campaigns. This was a testament to the power of the collective impact model, that allowed us to implement larger interventions, across wider geographies, impacting affected lives during these tough times.

Headstart STEM

With more than 1.5 million schools and 260 million students, our country's school system is amongst the largest in the world. The resources for Science and Mathematics in our schools are often inadequate. With an increasing number of jobs requiring these skills, our project Headstart STEM works towards promoting STEM learning, particularly amongst girls. Through this project, we upgrade infrastructure through STEM labs and AV equipment, Engage students through remedial classes, exposure visits and experiential learning, Train teachers in STEM pedagogy and Engage parents to create an enabling environment.


With 1.5 lakh deaths annually and almost 60 million Indians affected, viral Hepatitis continues to be a serious public health concern. With more than 80% of the infected individuals unaware of their infection, Hepatitis B and C are known to be silent killers. However, the stigma and discrimination associated with these infections is a significant hindrance towards health seeking behaviour and treatment compliance.

SEHAT works to increase awareness of Hep-B & C amongst high risk groups such as people who inject drugs, sexual minorities, female sex workers, single male migrants & truck drivers. These groups have remained on the peripheries of public health systems, often losing out on health access because of the discrimination faced by them. As a result, they fall prey to preventable diseases, are at high risk for developing co-morbidities & suffer loss of life and livelihood. The project aims to create awareness and increase health seeking behavior through the following interventions –

- Awareness Campaigns: Awareness and sensitization activities with high risk groups
- Testing and Vaccination Camps: Voluntary screening, testing and vaccination camps for non-infected individuals
- Medical Management: One-on-one health counselling for people with Hepatitis B

Saksham

The International Labor Organization (ILO 2020) report has indicated that an estimated 400 million informal economy workers in India are at risk of abject poverty due to COVID-19. The pandemic has added to existing challenges for women to generate income in the formal economy. Moreover, the significant and widening gender gaps in workforce participation rates, employment and wages that existed before the lock down are expected to intensify during the post-lock down period. Project Saksham aims to improve livelihood opportunities, particularly for women. This is done through training in job readiness skills, scholarships for vocational training and customised occupational tool kits for women entrepreneurs.

Mrs. Sunita Kanwar is a single parent with 3 children, living at Panchyawala in Jaipur city. After her husband passed away in 2017, she found it very difficult to convince family members to allow her to work. Her strong determination to remain independent led her to enroll herself in a beautician's course in 2019, which led her to become a beautician by trade. In 2020 and 2021, her business was hit hard during the pandemic. She had no income or customers and was left with obsolete beauty products. Her savings were exhausted by meeting the needs of the family amid the epidemic. Post lockdown, she wanted to grow her business but due to a lack of products, she was unable to work. After undergoing a rigorous selection process by the Saksham team, Sunita was selected to receive a beauty parlour kit. The kit consisted of all the tools required to kickstart her business, and provide at home beauty services. Equipped with the necessary tools, Sunita was now able to support herself earning an income of Rs. 7,000 a month.



Mission Mangroves

Recognizing the pressing need for preservation and restoration of mangroves, we have partnered with the Mangrove Cell, Forest Department, Govt. of Maharashtra to replenish and rejuvenate Mumbai's mangrove cover. Since 2015 we have planted more than 100000 mangrove saplings in the wetlands adopted by us in Koparkhairane and Navi Mumbai, ensuring complete greening of this land. In 2020, we adopted an additional plot of wetlands in Ghatkopar. 22,220 saplings were planted on this land, with a long term commitment for maintenance and monitoring over the next 5 years. Our team also carried out virtual sessions with citizen volunteers and corporate employees to create awareness about the importance of our mangroves and what we, as citizens, can do to help protect them.


